President's Letter

Every March I start off my letter to the community with some pithy observation about spring and its new beginnings. The gardens begin to bloom, the moving trucks start to roll through the streets, we look forward to the cherry blossom festival. What never gets mentioned is the flip side of this. For every "SOLD" sign that goes up, a friend and neighbor leaves.

Back in 2004, Jefferson Manor did not have a Neighborhood Watch. Matt Haws saw this as a shortcoming in the neighborhood, and decided to do something about it. Out of whole cloth, Matt created what is now an award-winning program. He worked tirelessly with our community liaisons with the local police to build a relationship that is the envy of other communities. Matt's program was held up as a model to other civic associations in the Mt. Vernon precinct. He gave presentations on how simple communication tactics between residents, neighborhood watch and the police could pay visible and immediate dividends.

Matt's wife Rachael was also a central figure in the revitalization of Jefferson Manor. She was integral in the creation of our website in 2005, and heavily involved in the restructuring of the JMCA during the same time period. She has

been active in our social committee planning and in the Jefferson Manor parents group. And as a team, they have created the signature JMCA annual event.

Our National Night Out event started out with a few signs and a box of hot dogs on a grill. They grew this to an event that regularly hosts over 130 people on a steamy August evening. Even with a growing family, they graciously opened their yard to us all to celebrate the bonds that we have built.

Matt and Rachael have made these investments to make Jefferson Manor a better, safer place for all of us. This spring, after almost a decade here, they are moving out. They leave behind them a model of what civic involvement should look like. Theirs are very big shoes to fill.

Already, several individuals have stepped in to reboot the neighborhood watch program. Their new ideas and energy are palpable, and I look forward to working through this transition with them. Our first step is to reintroduce those responsible for policing our neighborhood to you all at our next meeting. Officer Greg Kotterman has been involved with the community for years, and will be here to answer your questions about public safety in our area. Fort Drive Grass Triangle Update

JMCA is working with Delegate Sickles and Supervisor McKay to obtain permission from VDOT to maintain the grass triangle at the corner of Fort Drive and Monticello Road. We need your help designing how we would like to use the space. We envision a "Welcome to Jefferson Manor" sign surrounded by some mulch and native plants (mature growth under 4 feet to meet sightline requirements). We would like your help to figure out which plants to use and how things should be arranged. Transportation Updates:


The proposal for speed humps in Jefferson Manor goes before the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors on March 20. This is a formality, and will pass. Once this step is complete, we will get a better idea of when construction will begin. The hope is that it will be complete during the 2012 construction season.



In January, the JMCA Board voted to support the proposed design of the median strip on North Kings Highway. VDOT refused to allow a grass median due to maintenance concerns. Daily Storage of Trash Receptacles

It's springtime, the flowers are coming out, and the neighborhood housing market is about to enter its annual spring and summer bloom. How our neighborhood looks will affect all of our property values.

Outdoor trash containers serve a functional purpose but when not stored properly, they take away from the curb appeal of our homes. Storing the containers out of sight and behind privacy fences is the most ideal choice. Those who do not have privacy fences might simply hide it behind the house itself so as to reduce the chance of the container being seen from the street. You might also hide it behind shrubs, trees, or other dense foliage as long as it is at least 15 feet from your front lot line. Every little bit helps. (County Code requires that the containers be stored so that they cannot be seen from the street and must be at least 15 feet from the front lot line.)

Getting to know our Mt. Eagle Elementary School ... and why you should

Believe it or not, it's already that time of year when parents are asked to make enrollment decisions for the following school year. Mt. Eagle Elementary School is the public elementary school for Jefferson Manor. My daughter Sarah started there as a kindergartner last fall, and we have been extremely happy with her experience at the school. The school is an important part of our neighborhood community, and it has undergone a number of changes in the past few years. So, with enrollment dates approaching, it seems like a good time to update the neighborhood on the school.

Why is Mount Eagle important to our neighborhood?

The obvious answers are quality of education for Jefferson Manor children and property values for all homeowners. But there are also less obvious impacts: the school served as JMCA's meeting place for years before we moved to Janet's Java/Telegraph Station (and we may need to move back one day), it serves as the meeting place for local Brownie and Girl Scout troops, and the school grounds include a wonderful playground and a flat paved surface that is great for riding trikes and bikes. Also, even if not all of the children at Mt. Eagle live in Jefferson Manor, many of them will grow up in and around our community.

Two recent big changes at the school have the potential to really impact our neighborhood. First, last year the County completed a major multi-million-dollar renovation and expansion of the school. Gone are most of the trailers needed to address excess capacity. Added was a whole kindergarten wing, a beautiful new library, a pottery studio with kilns, additional classroom and administrative space, and lots of classroom upgrades. For example, all rooms in the school now have Smartboards and many have brand new equipment, and teachers have access to a number of new technologies for use in the classroom.

Second, Mt. Eagle helped parents by adding a before-and-afterschool (SACC) program following the completion of the renovations. However, the addition of this program removed some of the previous options that Jefferson Manor parents had for sending kids to other public schools in the area. Until Mt. Eagle added the before-and-afterschool program, Fairfax County policy permitted Jefferson Manor parents to send their children to other public schools in the area that did have SACC programs. As a result, the quality and reputation of Mt. Eagle may affect the decisions of more families (or prospective families) choosing whether to move to Jefferson Manor and therefore could have more of an impact on property values than it has in the past.

A snapshot of Mt. Eagle: a small neighborhood school on the rise

We love Mt. Eagle. The school has made huge improvements in recent years and has vastly exceeded our expectations, and other Jefferson Manor parents with children there have expressed the same sentiments. The school draws students from the Route 1 corridor in addition to Jefferson Manor and surrounding areas, so many of the students come from diverse socio-economic backgrounds. Many students qualify for free lunch programs, and many come from families where English is not the primary language in the home. In the not-so-distant past, the school had a reputation for low test scores and lack of parent involvement, but that has changed.

There is now an active group of parents who participate in the Parent Teacher Organization. Mt. Eagle offers a preschool program for lower income families so that a lot of those children enter kindergarten with the same educational advantages as Jefferson Manor kids who attended private preschools. The school participates in a modern model of learning that has increased test scores in recent years while stressing modern teaching practices, not teaching to the test.

Mt. Eagle is actually one of the smallest public K-6 schools in Fairfax County (265 students, compared to many schools in the County with over 400 students), which makes a big difference. Class sizes are smaller (18-20 kids in my daughter's kindergarten class, compared to 25-30 in most other schools) and the school has one full-time equivalent (FTE) teacher position for every 12 students, as compared to the state average of one for every 17 students, so the kids are also more likely to get more individual attention. The principal visited every entering-kindergartner's house before school



began to establish contact with their families and see where that kid is coming from, and then greeted each child by name when they walked into the school on the first day! We haven't heard of any discipline problems, expulsions, or other issues that are problems even at the elementary level in other County schools. There are no big debates about the needs for video surveillance, etc.

My daughter's kindergarten class has a first-rate, absolutely dedicated teacher who presents at national conferences, is up on the most current teaching theories on reading and math, hosts periodic "author celebrations" where parents are invited to hear their children present their own short books that they have created, has the kids Skyping with a class in Poland and Tweeting with other classes in Canada, Texas, Indonesia, and is just an excellent educator who really cares about each kid in the class. Most important to us, our daughter looks forward to going to school each day.



The school also has a new Principal, Jean Consolla, who has big shoes to fill (she replaced a popular principal who was selected to build a new school in Annandale from the ground up). She seems to be doing a good job so far, but she just arrived in January so parents and teachers are still getting to know her, and vice versa. The school is therefore at a potential transition point, so community support becomes even more critical.

What can you do to support our neighborhood school?

Like many schools nowadays, the teachers and administration are faced with limited budgets for classroom materials and extra-curricular activities like field trips, so teachers often use personal funds to buy materials and the PTO works to fund field trips and many other things that used to be provided as a matter of course when I was in school. There is also always a need for volunteers and mentors.



▶ Participate in fundraisers: because of modern safety concerns, door-to-door solicitation is not encouraged. However, our parents group is going to increase our efforts to use all the communications options at our disposal to keep the neighborhood more aware of fundraisers and other opportunities to support the school financially or with donations of items to be raffled off. This money goes to funding field trips and providing improvements at the school. If you are not on the neighborhood listserv but wish to receive notifications about Mt. - ▶ Enroll your Giant, Safeway, and Target cards and designate Mt. Eagle to receive funds whenever you make purchases at those stores (it doesn't cost you anything!): For more information, see <http://www.fcps.edu/MtEagleES/English/Support.html>.
- ▶ Collect the General Mills "Box Tops for Education" (the little coupon-like-things on the tops of cereal boxes, etc.) and Campbell Soup product UPCs and beverage caps/sauce caps and drop them off at the school or with parents who have kids at the school. It's easy, free, and it turns into real money for the school!
- ▶ Donate your used printer cartridges and cell phones to help the school earn technology equipment.
- ▶ Volunteer at the school: read to students, help with class activities, be a mentor.
- ▶ Spread the word about the improvements in the school! For many years Mt. Eagle did not have a good reputation in the community and Jefferson Manor parents were warned to stay away. Our neighborhood has a vested interest in educating people about the school's improvements: You never know who someone is going to talk to when they're considering whether to move into the neighborhood!
- ▶ Send your kids: Our neighborhood is filled with kids, so we have a big opportunity to impact the school. The school is good enough now that you don't have to feel like a pioneer. One key to the continued improvement in the school will be if Jefferson Manor parents choose to bring the same enthusiasm, skills, and community spirit to Mt. Eagle that they have brought to our successful neighborhood events. Parents are encouraged to contact the school to arrange a tour and sit in on a class.

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See the Space Shuttle!

For the second time in history, a space shuttle will land at Dulles airport. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity to see a space shuttle being ferried to the Washington, D.C. area. Discovery is scheduled to land at Dulles Airport on April 17, subject to weather conditions. On April 19, Discovery will officially be transferred to the National Air and Space Museum, Udvar-Hazy Center (NASM-UHC) during a fun-filled day of space-related activities such as performances, appearances by astronauts, and space displays. The space shuttle Enterprise will be transported from UHC to the Intrepid Museum in New York City.

This is a monumental event given this is the first time a space shuttle that has flown in space will be on display for the public to view. Discovery had 39 successful missions, over 27 years of service, and a total of 365 days in space.

The shuttle Enterprise, which has been on display at UHC, was used for testing in preparation for the subsequent shuttle missions that went into space.
