JMCA Treasurer’s Report for 2017

The Jefferson Manor Citizens Association (JMCA) is a non-profit civic association that depends on contributions, both in funds and volunteer resources, to support activities and events that benefit our Jefferson Manor community.

2017 was a break-even year for JMCA finances due to several enhanced activities and events. Our fall JMCA 70th Anniversary Block Party incurred higher costs that were fortunately offset by local business sponsorships solicited by JMCA President Alexis Glenn. Some revenue was lost due to newsletter advertising as only four (vs. the usual six) issues of the Neighborhood News newsletter were produced. The board of directors invited a professional graphic designer, who is a JM resident and provided complimentary services, to develop a fresh JM logo celebrating our neighborhood's distinctive features (e.g., duplexes and one-way streets). The new logo was utilized for all-new JM T-shirts and tote bags as a fundraising opportunity and it was also incorporated into an annual membership window-cling sticker. The Welcome Wagon, led by JMCA Chairman Kay Floyd, was especially active--at last check we welcomed around 70 new households this year!

Membership dues, advertisers, and generous donations support these and various other activities that benefit the JM community directly and indirectly. Funds also offset modest administrative costs for the small-but-mighty group of volunteer board members and others who represent the JM Neighborhood for Fairfax County initiatives and keep us informed about relevant topics via our social media platforms, in addition to providing many of their own resources at no cost to the JMCA. It is a testament to the frugality of the JMCA board that, on average, around 13% of the potential 565 dues-paying households and newsletter advertising cover all JMCA annual expenses!

Volunteer resources and funds will be especially important for 2018 as the 2017-18 board of directors has developed an ambitious strategic plan for developing even more opportunities to make our vibrant community hum with activities and engagement! All this, thanks to JM neighbors like you volunteering their time and efforts to generously give back to their community.

Update on the EMBARK Richmond Hwy Project

County staff will review the final draft of the EMBARK planning project at the last EMBARK Richmond Hwy open house: **Walt Whitman Middle School, January 10th, 6:30-9:00 pm**

Over the next ten years, this project will be transformative for this area. EMBARK is a multi-year process led by county staff and a citizen advisory group that lays out the high-level transformation of the Route 1 corridor by incorporating new transit and development options between the Capital Beltway and Jeff Todd Way/Mount Vernon Memorial Highway. The project includes major land use changes, including redevelopment of older commercial properties as higher density, mixed-use developments in six Community Business Centers, which are envisioned as live-workshop urban environments.

This effort has also renewed focus on North Kings Highway, and opportunities to bring increased bicycle and pedestrian amenities to the corridor.

Dispatches from Fork Drive

A Cooking Column

Fork Drive Goes French!

There's nothing like Paris in the springtime. As the seasons turn, it seemed right to revisit one of my favorite places: Paris. I love crepes and steak frites and cheese and chocolate. But the bread- oh, the bread. There is nothing like Parisian bread. Fresh from ovens older than America, with a hairline crust and a delicate body, Parisian bread is notoriously hard to replicate in the American kitchen. So difficult, the first edition of *Mastering the Art of French Cooking* suggests baking baguettes on asbestos tile for the characteristic snap. I don't have asbestos tile laying around, nor do I have access to French flours, which have different protein contents than commercial American flours, but I do have this recipe, which is as close as I've found to fresh bread by the Seine, where I joyfully ate an entire loaf with a wheel of cheese, fresh fruit, all washed down with wine straight from the bottle.

This isn't a traditional French bread; for one thing, it uses milk, while a true baguette does not. Nor do you have to have a french bread pan. If you love the lean shape of a baguette, a couche (a flax and linen cloth available at speciality stores) and baguette pan are great investments. For true aficionados, Julia Child's favorite cooking supply store, E Dehillerin, sells online. I bought my baguette pan there and it is, as Ferris Bueller would say, choice. For the less carb-obsessed, a baking sheet and some parchment paper are a great way to bring the pleasures of the Parisian palette to a Jefferson Manor kitchen.

This recipe has a couple of quirks. Bread flour is important, to help you develop the gluten that gives this bread its distinctive airiness but too much will make the dough hard to handle. Be careful with the temperatures of your milk and water, since they can easily zap the yeast of its leavening power. An infrared thermometer is an great gizmo to have in general but especially helpful here. Pay attention to lowering the temperature of the oven, because it helps the bread develop a crisp, razor thin crust. Don't be tempted to skip any of the rises; they are important to encourage well-rounded flavor. Other bread recipes allow for an overnight, refrigerator rise, but this isn't one that responds well. Please do not bake bread, or anything, on asbestos tile.

Faux French Bread

Yield: four baguettes or 20 dinner rolls

Sponge:

1 ½ tablespoons active, dry yeast (1 ½ packages)
1 tablespoon sugar
1 cup boiling water
1 cup refrigerator cold milk
2 cups unbleached all-purpose flour (not self-rising)

Dough:

1 tablespoon salt
3 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted and allowed to cool to room temperature
4 cups bread flour

Make sponge: put water into a large glass or plastic bowl. Add milk in a steady stream. Allow to cool to 105 to 115 degrees; ideally, you should be at 110 right after you've combined the milk and water. Add sugar and 1 cup of flour. Whisk hard until smooth. Add yeast, then remaining 1 cup of flour. Beat hard until smooth. Cover with plastic wrap and allow to rest at room temperature until doubled, about one hour at 68 degrees.

Make dough: combine salt, butter, and 1 cup of flour and beat with a whisk until smooth. Add the sponge, and whisk again. Add the remaining flour, ½ cup at a time until you have a soft dough that clears the side of the bowl. If you are using a mixer with a bread hook, increase the speed to medium-high and knead for 3 minutes. If working by hand, knead until a small piece of dough, stretched between your fingers, allows light to pass through. This is called the windowpane test; too little gluten and the bread won't stretch. This process will take around 5 minutes by hand.

Put the dough into a greased bowl, turning to ensure the entire loaf is lightly greased. Cover bowl with plastic wrap and let rise at room temperature until the dough has tripled in size, about two hours. Though tempting, don't cut this process short.

Turn the dough onto a lightly floured work surface and divide into quarters if making baguettes. Roll into long cylinders, about 10 inches long with 1 inch diameter. Place onto baking sheet (or baguette pan, if you're feeling fancy!), slash the top of each loaf with a knife, and let rise for 45 minutes.

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If making dinner rolls, divide the bread into quarters, then using scissors, snip each quarter into five pieces. Roll each dough section into a ball and place on a baking sheet. Snip the top of each roll in a decorative cross; let rise for 30 minutes.

Fill a cereal or soup bowl with ice. Put the bread into a 425 degrees oven and before closing the door, toss the ice on the floor of the oven. It will hiss and create steam. Professional ovens have steam injectors, but this is a trick for homebakers to create a beautiful crust. Also,

it sounds like you are doing insane chemistry experiments, which is fun.

Bake at 425 degrees oven for ten minutes, then reduce heat to 375 and bake until golden brown. For rolls, this process will take about fifteen additional minutes. For loaves, about twenty to twenty five. Try not open the oven door during cooking. If you aren't sure if the bread is done, tap the loaf or roll with your fingers. If it sounds hollow, it's baked.

Let the bread cool on a rack before serving. It will keep three or four days at room temperature if wrapped in plastic, but you won't have leftovers that long.


